FIRST LESSON: Ecclesiastes 1:2, 12-14; 2:18-23

The first lesson for Eighth Sunday after Pentecost is from the book of Ecclesiastes, the 1st chapter, beginning with the 2nd verse.

Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher,

vanity of vanities, says the Teacher, vanity of vanities! All is vanity.

I, the Teacher, when king over Israel in Jerusalem,

applied my mind to seek and to search out by wisdom

all that is done under heaven;

it is an unhappy business that God has given to human beings to be busy with. I saw all the deeds that are done under the sun;

and see, all is vanity and a chasing after the wind.

I hated all my toil in which I had toiled under the sun,

seeing that I must leave it to those who come after me -

and who knows whether they will be wise or foolish?

Yet they will be master of all for which I toiled and used my wisdom under the sun. This also is vanity.

So I turned and gave my heart up to despair

concerning all the toil of my labors under the sun,

because sometimes one who has toiled with wisdom and knowledge and skill must leave all to be enjoyed by another who did not toil for it.

This also is vanity and a great evil.

What do mortals get from all the toil and strain with which they toil under the sun? For all their days are full of pain, and their work is a vexation; even at night their minds do not rest.

This also is vanity.

PSALM 49:1-12 (the congregation responds with the bold words)

Hear this, all you peoples; give ear, all inhabitants of the world, both low and high, rich and poor together. **My mouth shall speak wisdom! The meditation of my heart shall be understanding.** I will incline my ear to a proverb; **I will solve my riddle to the music of the harp.**

Why should I fear in times of trouble, when the iniquity of my persecutors surrounds me, **those who trust in their wealth and boast of the abundance of their riches?**

SECOND READING: Colossians 3:1-11

The Second Reading for this Eighth Sunday after Pentecost is from the 3rd chapter of Colossians, beginning with the 1st verse.

[Paul writes:] So if you're serious about living this new resurrection life with Christ, act like it. Pursue the things over which Christ presides. Don't shuffle along, eyes to the ground, absorbed with the things right in front of you. Look up, and be alert to what is going on around Christ – that's where the action is.

See things from *Christ's* perspective.

Your old life is dead.

Your new life, which is your real life - even though invisible to spectators -

is your Christ in God.

Christ is your life.

When Christ (real life, remember) shows up again on this earth, you'll show up too – the real you, the glorious you.

Meanwhile, be content with obscurity, like Christ.

And that means killing off everything connected with that way of death; sexual promiscuity, impurity, lust,

doing whatever you feel like whenever you feel like it,

and grabbing whatever attracts your fancy.

That's a life shaped by things and feelings instead of by God.

It's because of this kind of thing that God is about to explode in anger.

It wasn't long ago that you were doing all that stuff and not knowing any better.

But you know better now, so make sure it's all gone for good:

bad temper, irritability, meanness, profanity, dirty talk.

Don't lie to one another.

You're done with that old life.

It's like a filthy set of ill-fitting clothes you've stripped off and put into the fire.

Now you're dressed in a new wardrobe.

Every item of your new way of life is custom-made by the Creator,

with God's label on it.

All the old fashions are now obsolete.

Words like Jewish and non-Jewish, religious and irreligious, insider and outsider, uncivilized and uncouth, slave and free, mean nothing.

From now on everyone is defined by Christ, everyone is included in Christ.

I'll tear down my barns and build bigger ones.
Then I'll gather in all my grain and goods, and I'll say to myself Self, you've done well!

"Just then God showed up and said, 'Fool! Tonight you die. And your barnful of goods – who gets it?'

"That's what happens when you fill your barn with Self and not with God."
